Huckleberry Botanic Regional Preserve, Oakland: This 241-acre preserve is an ecological jewel with a year-round display of blossoming plants. Tilden Regional Park, Berkeley: Every fall when the first rains start, California newts (Taricha torosa) begin their annual migration to creeks and ponds. Please be careful while hiking, biking, or running to avoid stepping on them. The newt produces a toxin in its skin to ward off predators. Some garter snakes exhibit a resistance to the toxin, resulting in the newts producing a more potent toxin. In turn, garter snakes develop an even greater resistance, leading to a newt/snake "evolutionary arms race." [Photo: Kevin Fox]

Quarry Lakes Regional Recreation Area, Fremont: The quarries that form this 47I-acre park date from the 19th century, when gravel from the banks of Alameda Creek was used to build western portions of the transcontinental railroad. Today, Quarry Lakes consists of four beautiful lakes and offers recreation such as picnicking, boating, swimming and fishing, as well as hiking and wildlife viewing.
