








Frequency of Visit




Reason for Visit



In Horse Trail






Additional Questions – COVID-19 Related





How about you, would you consider the East Bay Regional parks to be an essential service during COVID-19?




Would you consider the East Bay Regional parks to be an essential service during COVID-19?









How important is it to you to have the regional parks and trails open during the Coronavirus pandemic?



In a time when most people are in their homes the majority of the day, the accessibility of parks and trails plays an important role in maintaining the **mental health** of our community.



With school closures and limited activities for our youth, parks and trails are needed to provide a place where **children** in our community can be outside, play, and stay active.



Because of the Park District's on-going support of maintenance, construction, and restoration jobs in the East Bay, including many private sector contractors, the Park District **helps our local economy**.


